#### **SUMMER CAMP REFLECTIONS**

As Christmas music fills the air around me, I sit here reflecting on the warmer days of summer spent at camp and asking myself this question: How do we measure a successful summer at camp? There are probably lots of legitimate factors that come into play. When I look through the hundreds of photos from this past year; I see hugs, laughter, play, walks in the woods, heartfelt worship and genuine community. Each snapshot representing a camper that stepped away from whatever their story may look like at home, and attended a week of camp at El Porvenir. But how do we know, once they leave the mountain, that what we poured into their lives in that one short week was "successful" and will continue to grow?

In the latest issue of InSite Magazine, Peter Reid wrote, "If good seed lands on good soil, it will grow. It doesn't matter whether the farmer is ill fit for sowing. The power of the Gospel lies in the seed, not the sower. Furthermore, growth is usually unseen. Camp ministry provides a unique challenge to those who serve: We want to see results. If there is no visible indication that Jesus has worked during camp, we tend to be discouraged or feel obligated to give inflated testimonies, which don't always reflect the truth. When asked, 'How was the week?' it's perfectly acceptable to answer, 'I have no idea.'"

That may seem contradictory in the field we are in. We want to report that every heart that came to camp this summer walked away with a changed heart, but the truth is many of the faces in these pictures we may never see again here on earth. Peter goes on in the article to tell about his own story of coming to faith in Christ. At the age of 13 years old, while attending church camp, Peter was led to that decision by his 19 year old camp counselor. His counselor never knew the fruit that came to bear in Peter's life after that experience at camp until years later. Peter goes on to state, "He never knew what happened, but 35 years later I was happy to tell him. This event has helped me to pay more attention to the Source of our ministry, not the results. We serve Him to be faithful, not visibly successful." As staff at El Porvenir, we do not know all of the unseen things that God does in the lives of campers while at camp, but we do know this: that God is faithful to continue to do an eternal work in their hearts even after they leave here. We planted the seeds, and hopefully there are others back at home who will water, but it is **God** that will cause the growth... long after the sounds of campers laughter have stopped echoing on the mountain.
